Submissions investigating the various types of genericity including characterizing sentences, reference to kinds sentences, dispositional sentences, and habituals are strongly welcomed. In addition, this special issue welcomes submissions investigating the syntactic-semantic interaction between genericity and other semantic phenomena like (in)definiteness, quantification, and iterativity.
